The VCF was established to compensate for physical harm and deaths caused by the terrorist-related aircraft crashes of September 11, 2001 and the debris removal efforts that took place in their immediate aftermath.

Potential claimants include first responders as well as individuals who lived, worked or volunteered in the areas near the World Trade Center site, the Pentagon site, and the Shanksville, Pennsylvania crash site.
