THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON

October 12, 2002



Department Medal of Valor



Shortly after World War II, there was a major change. The medal also was awarded to the next of kin of members who died in the line of duty.

Since 1960 and to the present, the medal has been awarded posthumously and exclusively for line-of-duty deaths to the next of kin of the departed.

Uniformed Firefighters Association/Uniformed Fire Officers Association Medal of Supreme Sacrifice

This medal first was awarded in 1946 to the next of kin to honor posthumously those members who met death in the performance of duty during 1945. It has been awarded continuously ever since.

The obverse side bears in bas-relief the figure of a Fireman carrying a child from a burning building. A painting by C.C. Beall, war correspondent/artist of *Collier's Weekly* and formerly official illustrator for the Treasury Department in bond drives for World War II, inspired this motif.

International Association of Fire Fighters (1977) Medal of Honor

This solid gold medal is awarded to the families of IAFF members who are killed in the line of duty. The memorial medal features the IAFF logo flanked by oak leaf clusters and bears the words, *Dedication, Honor, Sacrifice*. The reverse side of the medal bears the name of the fallen Firefighter. The medal has been awarded to 863 IAFF members killed in the line of duty since it was established in 1990.

The medal is dedicated to Martin E. Pierce, a former IAFF Secretary-Treasurer who, for many years, assisted fire departments and families with claims for the Public Safety Officer Death Benefit.

World Trade Center Medal of Valor

This medal will be presented to the families of members who died in the line of duty while operating at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. One side features three solemn Firefighters, viewing the devastation wrought by the terrorist attack. The words, *Medal of Valor*, are placed prominently within the depiction. The date, *September 11, 2001*, and location, *World Trade Center*, encircle the image.

Struck by Tiffany Company, the other side replicates the Maltese Cross and incorporates FDNY and the departed member's name, rank and company. The phrase, *Greater Love Hath No Man Than To Lay Down His Life For Another*, encircles the artwork.

EMS Medal of Supreme Sacrifice

First cast in 1994, this medal was awarded to the family of Christopher J. Prescott, who was the first EMS member to lose his life in the line of duty. In 1997, the medal subsequently was awarded to the husband of Tracy Allen-Lee, who was the second member to sacrifice her life while caring for others. This medal will continue to be awarded to those who make the Supreme Sacrifice.

Engraved in the medal is the image of female and male emergency medical technicians lifting a patient into the back of an ambulance while rendering patient care. The inscription, *EMS Medal of Supreme Sacrifice*, encircles the artwork.

Poets and children, stockbrokers and bartenders, baseball players and taxi drivers; New Yorkers have always stood in awe of firefighters and emergency service personnel, as they run toward situations most people would flee from. On September 11th, 2001, the whole world caught a glimpse of what our City sees every single day—the calm heroism of the greatest fire department in the world.

The unwavering sense of duty and honor in our ranks comes with a willingness to sacrifice one's life so that others may live. Today we are honoring 352 members of our Department who gave their lives in the line of duty since October 2000. During the first 135 years of our history, we lost 774 members of the Department. So it is with great pain and a sense of tremendous loss that so many individuals join our brotherhood of heroes.

But though their absence is felt every day and in every firehouse and EMS station, we should not feel hollow because they are gone. We should be filled with the inspiration their example has given us. The memory of their valiant service and sacrifice will help move this Department forward. The brave souls who have given their lives in the line of duty are too great to ever truly die. We will not let them. They have become a part of our own lives and they will always be a part of our Department's proud history and honorable traditions.

We will never forget our fallen Brothers. And their lasting legacy will be found in the way we honor all those we have lost by striving, every day, to live up to their example of duty, courage and sacrifice.

May God bless their memory and their families and may God bless the New York City Fire Department.

The most important and most solemn event on the FDNY calendar is our Annual Memorial Day Service conducted each October, traditionally at the Firemen's Monument in Riverside Park. Members of the Department gather to honor their departed Brothers and to convey their feelings of love, respect, fraternity and loyalty to the families of our heroes.

This year, everything has changed and nothing has changed. We are at a vastly different venue; the scale of the service has increased geometrically and there is national and international attention, the likes of which we have never seen.

Today, we pay tribute to 352 FDNY heroes who made the Supreme Sacrifice, 343 on one infamous day, September 11, 2001. The spirit, commitment and dedication of Firefighters remain unchanged. They gave their lives, not for family, friends or neighbors, but for complete strangers. Whether one or two or three at a time--or as 343--they courageously met the danger before them as others fled. As we move forward, training, responding, adapting to the post-9/11 environment, we do so in their memory, in their honor. They have raised the bar, set new standards for us to live up to. We owe them that and we owe their families a continuing debt for sharing their loved ones, their Firefighters with us.

October 12, 2002

Family members, firefighters and honored guests:

We gather today to honor the memory of the finest group of heroes that the world has ever seen, New York City firefighters who have laid down their lives for others. In the past two years, the Fire Department of the City of New York lost 352 of its own, a number that no one ever thought possible. Each of you has felt these losses in unique and personal ways. Together, we have felt these losses as a city and a nation united in grief.

These men did not join the department for the glory, for the money or for the accolades — and they did not wish to be called heroes. They joined for reasons few people can understand these days: duty, honor and service. But thanks to their sacrifice, thousands of men, women and children are alive today and concepts like selflessness and courage have found new power in our nation and beyond.

We, the expanded family of the International Association of Fire Fighters and our two New York unions, the Uniformed Firefighters Association, Local 94, and the Uniformed Fire Officers Association, Local 854, never forgot why we became firefighters and union members. Today, there is not one among us who would not gladly trade everything we have to have our brothers, husbands, sons or fathers back. Members of the IAFF also acknowledge the loss of the members of Uniformed EMTs and Paramedics, Local 2507. The pain of our loss continues and we feel it each time we remember the faces, the voices and the laughter of FDNY's fallen.

Our duty now is to continue to remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice: by serving this city and our nation honorably; by rebuilding and strengthening this fire department to its days of glory; and by living up to the lofty example our fallen brothers have set for us. Together, we pledge never to forget their sacrifice and never to fail in our own sacred duties as leaders of the union that represents New York's Bravest.

A 137-Year History of Commitment, Courage and Compassion



My father came into the Department in 1926, I think. I was born in 1929. My father retired before I came into the Department. I came into the Department in '59; he retired in '58. There is maybe not a firehouse culture, but a Fire Department culture and it's a very special culture. When you have a Department whose men and women are expected to be ready at any moment to put their lives on the line, to go to the aid of a stranger, even when it means that you may put yourself in dire peril, I don't think you can pay people to do that job. There has to be something beyond money that makes them do that.

This Department is rich in tradition. It's rich in history. We have a Memorial Day where we gather at the Firemen's Monument on 100th Street and we honor all those Firefighters who died in the past year, either in the line of duty or from natural causes. But we have this every single year.

You know, we've had 127 years of a paid Fire Department in New York City and in that 127 years, we've lost 752 people. That's an awfully large number. And I don't think anybody who doesn't understand this, understands this Department. And I think we all have the same wish. And that is that this is the last and we'll never lose another. But I know, I know as sure as I'm sitting here that no matter what we do, no matter how well we train, no matter how good our equipment is, no matter how hard we try, no matter, no matter what, unfortunately, there'll be a 753rd.


